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SOUTH AFRICAN MARIST PILGRIMAGE

After 32 hours of travelling, our group made up of 2 staff members from each of the 5 South African Marist Schools as well as Mike Greeff (Director of Marist Schools Council), Br Fortune Chakasara, Br John Bwanali and Fr John Enslin arrived at the General House in Rome and were warmly welcomed by the residing Brothers as well as Br Joseph Walton who would be our Pilgrimage leader over the next two unforgettable weeks. It is difficult to put so many joyful, overwhelming and emotional experiences that we shared together into a few lines of text.

Besides the incredible experience of spending time at the Vatican Museum, the Sistine Chapel and St Peter's Basilica we were also fortunate enough to be taken to a number of other basilicas, sights and churches in Rome, each of which had its own unique and fascinating history. Highlights included having Mass in the Catacombs of St Callixtus, climbing the 551 stairs of the St Peter's Basilica dome, and getting as close to Pope Francis as indicated in the photograph below.

Marist! We left the General House in Rome filled with so many emotions and memories as well as excitement for the week ahead in France.

After the hustle and bustle of Rome we pilgrims headed off to France to stay with the Brothers at Notre Dame de l'Hermitage in Saint-Chamond. We were welcomed by Brother Maurice Berquet who would act as our tour guide for the next few days. His wonderful stories about Champagnat and the Marist Brothers both educated and entertained us. The tone of the pilgrimage changed into something more inward and self-reflective as we were challenged to literally walk in the footsteps of Marcellin Champagnat. This was also a wonderful way to experience the beautiful French countryside. Having Mass around the table at La Valla where Champagnat sat with his brothers was a highlight and a deeply moving ceremony. A day of reflection allowed us to explore the Hermitage and connect on a deeper level to what being Marist means. The temperature continued to heat up as we visited the Basilica of Notre-Dame de Fourvière in Lyon, the Cathedral Notre-Dame du Le Puy-en-Velay and attended a spectacular Mass at Taizè. After two weeks abroad and walking a distance of 160kms it was time to head back home.

Our group connected with one another from day one. It has been quite extraordinary to experience this strong spiritual bond amongst our members. We know that we will never forget this journey, that is sure to have an impact on the rest of our lives. We thank the Marist Community for this opportunity of a lifetime! We left South Africa as strangers and returned as special Marist friends.

MESSAGE FROM BR ERNESTO SÁNCHEZ TO THE BROTHERS OF SOUTHERN AFRICA

Dear Brother Norbert Mwila and Brothers of the Southern Africa Province:



Greetings from the General House, in Rome. I am writing to you at this significant moment in the life of your province as you prepare for the next Provincial Chapter. This provides a good opportunity to reflect on the life of the Province, strengthen the vitality of the Province and be more open to God's will.

In preparing for the upcoming Chapter it is worthwhile for each of you to reflect on the two important questions that helped guide the discernment of the General Chapter. **What is God calling us to leave**, to let go of (personally, in community, in each country, as a Province); and **what is God calling us to let come into our lives?** Reflecting on these two questions will prepare you to discern the best direction to grow Marist Life and Mission in the Province.

After the General Council's reflection and the study of the recent sondage for Provincial, Brother Norbert Mwila has been appointed for another three-year term as Provincial of Southern Africa. Last 18th June, I sent you a communication to announce his appointment, indicating that he will begin his new mandate on October 28, 2019 at the beginning of the Provincial Chapter. I want to thank Norbert for his generosity in accepting this challenging mission and his availability to serve his Brothers.

I mentioned that, before the Provincial Chapter, I will send you "an echo" of the answers and comments given in the sondage. I want to thank all of you for your reflections and recommendations concerning Marist life and mission in the Province of Southern Africa over the past three years. Your insights are helpful in looking towards the future.

The information contained in this letter, as well as the calls of the 22nd General Chapter, can offer you some points for further reflection and discernment.

[The synthesis of the above-mentioned reflections and recommendations will reach the Brothers in a separate communication.]

Conclusion

Let me conclude by thanking you Brothers for your sincerity and honesty in offering these reflections. As usual there are many more positive aspects than difficulties.

With your contributions, you have been realistic in understanding the reality of your Province and hopeful about its future. You have named the many signs of life and vitality and the many challenges ahead.

I would like to finish this letter by asking the help of God to strengthen our faith, generosity and commitment as Brothers in community and in the Province.

You have a good, life-giving path. We believe that Brother Norbert and his new team, which will be elected by the Provincial Chapter next October, can face these challenges. They will continue their mission of serving the vitality of Marist life and mission and leading the province to be attentive to the will of God. Surely your fraternal support, and the maternal presence of Mary will help in your common journey.

I also wish to thank Brothers Oscar Martín Vicario and Ken McDonald, General Councillors links for this Province, who collaborated with me in carrying out the summary of the sondage and assisted me in preparing this communication.



As you know, our 22nd General Chapter invites us to "Journey together as a Global Family, to be a beacon of hope, to be the face and hands of God's tender mercy,

HOLIDAY PROGRAM – ATLANTIS INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY



In March of 2019, the Atlantis Marist International Community expanded from four to six members with the welcome arrival of Brazilian married couple, Juliana and Diogo. Initially, they spent two months living with the Marist Brothers Community in Rondebosch and attending English language classes before then moving to Darling to join Maria and the Brothers Tony, Nnodu and Pietro.

From the end of June to the beginning of July (17/06 to 05/07), the Atlantis Marist International Lavalla200> Community contributed to various activities for the children, teenagers and young people of Atlantis during their mid-year school holidays. During these three weeks, the community supported the local team at Rebecca Van Amsterdam Hall. From the 24th to 28th June, the community took responsibility for coordinating a week-long Holiday Program, assisted by leaders from Saint Joseph Marist College, Saint John the Baptist Parish and the local team.

The objective of the Holiday Program was to offer the young people of Atlantis a safe and peaceful space for recreational and educational activities. Given the social reality of Atlantis, it was wanted to guarantee the children, teenagers and young people their right to play and learn.

An average of 150 children per day participated in the program’s activities. These activities included games, sport, dance, co-operative games; artistic workshops, cultural presentations and educational activities (life’s project, anti-bullying, developing good relationships and assertive communication).

The Atlantis Marist International Community sees these Holiday Programs closely connected with the call of the XXII General Chapter for Marists of Champagnat to be with amongst children and young people in situations of social vulnerability.

The *NEW HORIZONS* program is promoted by the Conference of Major Superiors of Africa, FMSI, the Secretariat for Education and Evangelisation of the Marist Institute and is financially supported by *Misean Cara*, the official aid agency of the Irish government.

Late in July, two Marist Educators from each country in our Province took part in a workshop held in Maputo. The sessions were animated by Mr Andrea Rossi & Br Mark Omede of our Secretariat for Education and Evangelisation.

The objective of this educational programme is to develop Marist educators through ongoing formation in pedagogy, educational leadership and management. In the first phase, selected school leaders from the each of our five countries were gathered at a central point in the Province for a workshop. In this second phase, the project will be carried out in each of the countries to increase the probability of making an impact on day-to-day practices in our 21 schools.




Br Norbert presents a gift to Andrea Rossi at the end of the New Horizons Workshop

TWO PUBLICATIONS OF INTEREST

Brother James Langlois has recently completed a very comprehensive history of the presence and mission of the Marist Brothers in Zimbabwe.

The publication is attractively produced, with A4-size pages wire-bound in a firm cover. Many relevant photos are attractively arranged in its 80 pages. The font is relatively large, and easy to read.




Probably most of the members of our Province are unaware that the first group of Brothers sent to Africa from Canada were actually destined to work in Roma in Basutoland (now Lesotho) replacing the Brothers from the then South African Province. Br James devotes the first chapter of his work on the fruits of his research on the reasons for diverting this pioneer group from Basutoland to Southern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe).

The Chapter on Marist ministry in Southern Rhodesia outlines the progress from the foundation in Kutama (1939), and the successive decades leading up to independence, and the following years up to the creation of the current Province of Southern Africa in 1999.

The final section covers the contemporary situation in the country, mentioning those Zimbabwean Brothers serving the Institute in formation houses outside their country.

This *opus* will be of great interest to our Zimbabwean Brothers and Lay Marists. Brothers in other parts of the Province would also profit from reading the work to give them an idea of the courage of any pioneering Marist missionaries. .



“I am on my phone too much—a lot more often than necessary. Most people are, and looking at our phones has become a default state: in the elevator, in the car, in queues, on the street, in the office, at a meal with my Brothers, in the community room, with family or friends”

The first half of the book explains the damage extensive use of our phones causes, from how **they’re designed to addict us** to how they’re **damaging our brains** to how they **cause mental stress** to how they **deprive us of a good night's sleep**.

The second half of the book is Price’s 30 day guide to “the break up,” which is not to chuck your phone in a body of water, but a guide to having a relationship with our phone on our own terms—the relationship that we often say we want, but won’t force ourselves to have.

This is a book that will help any Brother **personally**, but also be an invaluable resource for an **educator** of young people, especially if your ministry involves **providing a life orientation** for future generations.



“YOUNG PEOPLE WITH A VISION CAN CHANGE THE WORLD”

A Pilgrim's View

The airline magazine wasn't wrong when it claimed that 'Rome has everything it takes to flood the senses and to overpower them: history, excess, power, conflict, decadence and most extraordinary beauty'. Magnificent domes and towering steeples dot the skylines, and you are never too far from a church richly decorated with frescos or mosaics, or both.

Emerging from a subway you can find yourself in the street life of a bustling city. We walked briskly to keep up with our group, often squeezing past others also clamouring to get a glimpse of the wonders of this city. The restored frescos, marble statues, tapestries, paintings and other objects are overpowering; and greenery and quiet of the gardens are a respite from the throngs of tourists.




As a pilgrim you have to make your way to St Peter's Basilica. The basilica towers above you, giving you a sense of God's grandeur. It's hard to believe that you are standing before a sculpture that dates back to 1499 when you admire Michelangelo's Pieta.

While climbing up to the top of the dome I met a Coptic priest and a Buddhist monk, all in awe of this spectacle. The view over St Peter's Square and the surrounding city is breath-taking – you certainly get a sense of the vastness of the eternal city.

On the outskirts of the city we find ourselves in the quiet the Trappist Monastery at Tre Fontane (dating back to 299). Here we visited two Churches marking the sites of St Paul's imprisonment and execution. The monophonic sounds of the monks voices resound off the ancient chapel walls giving you a feeling that are truly in a holy place.

The next day the spine-tingling sight of the Colosseum hits you as soon as you emerge from the underground station. We are immediately offered ice cold water to buy. The ruins speak of the grandeur of ancient times, and the shoulder-to-shoulder crowds around the ruins are a reminder of what it might have been like in ancient times.




We then travel to Lyon to what is known as Champagnat country. St Marcellin was born in Marlies in the year of the storming of the Bastille - the political, economic and social unrest of the day that impact on his priorities and life. After his ordination, Marcellin is

appointed priest in La Valla. Struck by the isolation in which people live and the lack of education in the rural area; and after attending to a dying sixteen-year-old who did not know basic Catholic teaching, he acts upon his conviction of the need for religious Brothers. We walk some of the paths from the hamlets to La Valla.

He encourages two young men to join him to form the core of the Marist Brothers, and others soon follow. La Valla becomes the birthplace of the Marist Brothers. Between 1817 and 1824 he started a primary school at La Valla which becomes a teacher training centre for his young brothers. As pilgrims we are privileged to celebrate the Eucharist at Marcellin's old wooden table in the house at La Valla.

We stay at the Hermitage near Saint-Chamond, where Champagnat built a novitiate. The building was a sign of his trust in God and of the success the Brothers had become. What strikes me about the life of St Marcellin Champagnat is his absolute resolution to be a priest, despite the many setbacks. The multi-storey Hermitage that he and his brothers built is testimony to the determination they had.

An expected surprise for us on pilgrimage is the opportunity to participate in the Sunday Mass at Taizé. The spirit of the place is just as I imagined it would be. There is a tremendous sense of community among the different people from all over the world. I am excited to see so many enthusiastic young people. The place is simple, but the experience is very powerful.

I reflect on the life of the founder, Brother Roger, who as a young man left Switzerland in the war years to establish a house that accommodated both Christian and Jewish refugees. Later he establishes a monastery which promotes ecumenical ideas and work among the youth.

At the airport at Rome I pick up a book written by a lesser known young person Greta Thunberg. She's a young Swedish activist who, at age 15, began protesting outside the Swedish parliament about the need for immediate action to combat climate change. She is now an outspoken climate activist and has even got a TED Talk. Greta reminds us again of the power of young people.

In a speech to British MPs earlier this year she tells them: "You lied to us. You gave us false hope. You told us that the future was something to look forward to. And the saddest thing is that most children are not even aware of the fate that awaits us. We will not understand it until it's too late. And yet we are the lucky ones. Those who will be affected the hardest are already suffering the consequences. But their voices are not heard."

The message of people like St Marcellin, Br Roger and Greta Thunberg is simply that young people with a vision can change the world.
